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## From the Board

### 52<sup>nd</sup> LWV National Convention

Plymouth Area LWV – Convention Report

Annual Meeting June 23, 2016

I attended the 52<sup>nd</sup> National convention with over 700 other delegates from 49 states. There were 34 delegates from MA. Unfortunately I missed the Lobby Day excursion to the Senate but since learned that neither Senator Warren or Senator Markey were available – maybe still sleeping after the Filibuster the night before! So not much lost. MA delegation thought this activity was poorly managed.

Friday: two great speakers –

Jennifer Lawless – *Engaging Millennials in our Elections*. Her book “*Running From Office*” was the basis of her speech. The book gives the results of a large study of millennials and how they feel about politics and it is not good. There were breakout sessions at 7:15 AM and 8:45 PM – the morning ones were in rooms not large enough and I was a bit late so I skipped them but the evening one I attended was on BrinGing Gun Safety to America – The Center for American Progress was the speaker.

Saturday: again morning sessions at 7:15 am – I attended the Water/Climate Nexus, very interesting speaker from Nature Conservancy but not much next step information

PROPOSED 2016-2018 LWVUS BYLAWS Change: Several motions /amendments that ended up with Article III Membership reworded to like this:

***Persons at least 16 years of age who join the League shall be voting members of local Leagues, state Leagues, and of the LWVUS; (1) those who live within an area of a local League may join that League or any other local League***

The morning speakers were Peter Overby, from NPR on Money in Politics – the least effective speaker we heard and Joe Goldman from the Democracy Fund whoes speech was titled “*Complex systems and Major forces at Play in 2016*”. The Democracy Fund is new ( funded by Ebay founder) but has already given \$30 million to strengthen democracy. Topics include small donor contributions, increasing trust in government, campaign finance reform. Voter guides are very important in his mind.

The afternoon speakers were Keesha Gaskins, Democratic Practice – “*Understanding and Telling the Story of Impact for Democracy with Data*” who actually spoke second as her train was delayed and Celinda Lake, Lake “*Research Partners – Messaging for Impact - What resonates with Voters in 2016*”. She is president of a polling firm working mostly with female candidates and what resonates with women. With a discussion of the phrase “non-partisan” – it is not well understood. Women are still unsure of their understanding of the issues and not using the messaging of crisis. Wants to get voters to actually vote by asking registered folks for their plan to vote. Choice between two negatives at top of ballot – focus down ballot or show the voting record thru voter guide. Her polling shows “people love the League, though think we are not visible enough”.

Then we did tactical training with small group participation in a simulation exercise on registering voters at a naturalization ceremony. OK but not relevant to smaller Leagues.

The banquet speaker was Ari Berman whose book “*Give us the Ballot*” came out last year. It details the current struggle for Voting Rights in American. He was by far the best speaker. One nugget from him is that Chief Justice John Roberts has been working on restricting voter rights since the Reagan administration!!!

### 52<sup>nd</sup> LWV National Convention

Sunday:

Motion to adopt the proposed LWVUS budget for 2016–2018 keeping PMP at \$32.

Motion to move a resolution responding to gun violence in America. In the wake of our country's worst mass gun violence in our history that killed 49 people in Orlando, Florida, we ask **for a moment of silence** to remember those who were killed, pray for peace for their families and friends and strength for the community and our country.

Be it resolved to continue our longstanding LWVUS position on Gun Violence. Motion APPROVED

Motion to move a resolution on gun safety and Center for Disease Control Research  
Support restoration of funding for gun violence research at the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).  
Motion #2016-47, LWV of Florida Motion APPROVED

5 recommendations for improving the picture from the book are:

The YouLead Initiative – a proposal to cultivate the next generation of elected leaders

Playstation for Politics – getting a video game to focus on politics like *Simcity*

Political Ambition – Put that in your Bong and Smoke it - make political engagement part of the college experience including having colleges look favorably on students who get involved in politics like they do for volunteer hours

Girl Interrupted – Increase College Women's Political Ambitions – even though few want to run for office twice as many men are interested than women. There are pilot local programs out there to work on this

The GoRun App – catalog of positions and info about the office and how to run for it by location

Amanda Taub – Understanding American Authoritarianism. She spoke about research linking authoritarian parent styles to voting propensities and how authoritarians are very afraid of change in the status quo. Very enlightening

General – there are 762 leagues nationwide with 1512 voting delegates of which 784 were registered from 47 states. The outgoing President Elizabeth MacNamara spoke and the nominations for the new slate were presented.

In the afternoon we heard from a panel on Protecting the Right to Vote and Expanding the Electorate with representatives from National Lawyers Committee, NALEO (National Assoc. of Latino Elected & Appointed) and APIAVote (Asian & Pacific Islander Vote) on the issues effecting minorities.

Then heard about the Board recommended program called Making Democracy Work which covers Voter protection and mobilization, Election reform and Money in politics, constitutional amendment and redistricting – pretty much our main mission. There were about 50 not recommended items submitted by leagues around the country.

There were two concurrences requested – the first on a redistricting position meant for states who do not already have a position and that caused much consternation as Florida who had just won a 10 year battle to get the state to accept FL LWV plan for the 2020 redistricting felt it would weaken their position. It passed none the less. The second was much less controversial it being a change of the second sentence of the LWVUS Health Care position to say:

*Every US citizen should have access to affordable, quality in- and out- patient behavioral health care, including needed medications and supportive services that is integrated with, and achieves parity with physical health care.*

### 52<sup>nd</sup> LWV National Convention

The report of the Treasurer was given with lots of conversation as the LWVUS lost \$800,000 in the stock market in last two years. A budget was proposed for next 2 years that did not include drawing from the reserve. There were discussion sessions over the following 2 days and a vote to accept on Sunday. There were also staff and program cuts.

Motion to move a resolution supporting statehood for the people of District of Columbia. Therefore, be it resolved that the League of Women Voters of the United States strongly supports legislation that will establish statehood for the people of the District of Columbia. Motion APPROVED

Motion to move a resolution: Therefore, be it resolved, the LWVUS consider signing onto an Amicus Brief with the 21 youth plaintiffs from Our Children's Trust. Motion APPROVED (Climate Change)

Motion to move a resolution: Therefore be it resolved, LWVUS support the United States ratification of the UN COP 21 Paris Agreement. Motion APPROVED

Motion to move a resolution: Therefore be it resolved, that the LWVUS should continue working for full implementation of the EPA Clean Power Plan, especially at the state level, as a first step and should call on the White House to implement an updated science-based Climate Action Plan that stabilizes global warming by bringing CO2 levels down to no more than 350 ppm by 2100. Motion APPROVED

### LWVMA

Marilyn Peterson, LWVMA Membership Chair, opened the meeting with a review of the attachments. The attachment entitled FS Information and Links provides an overview of the links. **The categories are:**

**General Membership and Calendar Planning** (attached) - This is an excellent two-sided event/activity planning checklist.

**LWVMA Charter School Study** (attached) - This provides the study timing and process.

#### **New LWVUS Positions**

**Voter Service:** There are two attachments: MA Election Reforms is a Guide for Local Leagues in three areas: Online **Voter Registration, Early Voting and Pre-registration of 16-17 year olds**. It identifies areas where local leagues can help and an election timeline. **Move 2016:** Join the Movement is designed to provide voters throughout the Commonwealth with resources to encourage participation and informed choice for the 2016 elections. The attachment describes the following elements: **Vote411.org** Online Voters Guide; Early Voting Challenge; Eye-catching print and digital educational materials; **"YOUth Should Vote!** Student Video Contest and League Choice Books for Children and Teens. In addition there are a number of additional links for Voter Service information.

Guidance on Opportunities (attached)- a two-page document providing guidance on planning for the league year

Woman's Suffrage Celebration Coalition of MA (attached)- a two page document planning for the 2020 100th year celebration of the adoption of the 19 amendment as part of a coalition

We had an extensive discussion on early voting. LWVMA is asking local leagues to work with their town clerks on their program for early voting. The Falmouth league works closely with their town clerk who is very supportive of early voting. He explained the logistical and financial challenges facing town clerks for early voting.

Marilyn mentioned that the LWVUS has changed their bylaws as follows: a person can join the league but doesn't have to be a citizen. Lowered the age to sixteen. Over time there will be other by updates.

The ballot questions will be available in August. LWVMA is hoping that local leagues will have forums on the ballot questions. We should present both sides on questions where we don't have a position. On questions where we do have a position, we don't have to present both sides.

Marion had 150 attendees at a candidates' night. Offices were contested. Mattapoisett had a meet, greet and warrant review on a Sunday afternoon in the library.

MMR has a good relationship with their town managers and town clerks.

They had the largest number of H.S. seniors registering to vote. They do registration at graduation practice.

The Cape Cod Area league focused on civic ed grants, county government, health care, meeting legislators at a legislative breakfast, a membership holiday event, suffragette movie and voter service activities.

Falmouth focused on monthly membership meetings open to the public. Topics were two consensus meetings on money in politics and a constitutional amendment on money in politics, meeting legislators, candidates' nights, local issues and a membership meeting at the home of Doris Epstein. Handwritten Invitations with follow up phone calls were sent to 20-25 people.

Doris called everyone's attention to ICivics, a Sandra Day O'Connor program on civic ed.

**PLANS FOR FALL VOTING**

MMR will register new voters and students at back to school night.

CCA is focusing on voter ed and voter registration

Falmouth will hold a candidates' night or nights for local and state offices. They have a focus to get out the vote in Falmouth because only 21% of registered voters voted in a recent election. They have nine precincts.

They registered sixty high school students at high school graduation practice in the spring.

There was a discussion of joint league candidates' nights. The primary issue is driving distances at night.

**MEMBERSHIP**

MMR has been unsuccessful getting members for league meetings. They are contributors financially but not available for day to day operation. Many of their members are involved in other organizations such as the New Bedford symphony. They have forty-seven members with five new members.

CCA has 82 members. They are looking to partner with other non profits in the area to increase impact and, possibly, membership.

Falmouth has 100 members. New members have offset their annual attrition so the number of members has held steady.

Jackie Webster, the Falmouth membership chair and attendee, said she's always on the lookout for new members with membership brochures, LWV notes and self-addressed envelopes. She's looking for other civically engaged women.

Marilyn mentioned that the Hamilton-Wenham league proposed a town wide event - non league - which was held. Six or seven people joined the league as a result.

Other sources of PR - paid ads, letters to the editor, announcing events on the WCAI public radio station.

Marilyn reported that the National LWV has many new board members and a new executive director who came from the American Heart Association. They are looking at all aspects of the league including the three tiered structure. How can the league be more effective and not spend so much money? There are three primary areas of concern in addition to financial: members vs. departures; aging demographics; model - joining organizations is different.

## From the Board

### Minutes of the Field Service Meeting for the so. Shore,, Cape Cod and Martha's Vineyard

At the state board retreat, they decided to target new areas: colleges and universities, inner cities, affinity/advocacy groups. Does the state league need a new board structure? The internet allows for changes in organizational structure. There's also a need to develop new leadership.

Falmouth has several levels of participation in their league - scholarship, supporting and membership. Supporting are not active members. A supporter defines the amount of their annual support. Their names are published in their bulletin.

One participant, who is new to the league, said that the league seems reluctant to adopt new ideas. Responses might be that we already tried that and it didn't work or we don't do it that way. .

### CONCLUSION

The meeting concluded at 1:00 P.M.. The next meeting will be held early in the new calendar year. A date will be selected closer to January 2017.

MMR has difficulty getting attendance at league meetings and participation in the operation of the league. Their members are involved in other activities, such as the New Bedford Symphony, so they're not available for the day to day operation of the league. They can get money. They cleared \$10K on their blue book phone directory which is available in hard copy and on line. There are forty-seven members in MMR with five new members.

MMR also registers new voters at back to school night.

Cape Cod Area had a number of programs throughout the 2015/16 year: Consensus Discussion on Pending Legislation on the Pilgrim Power Station; Fundraiser Concert on a Sunday afternoon; Just Don't Stand There, Run Workshop; Health Committee Forum, Legislative Breakfast; Moderating Candidates' Nights, Membership Holiday Event with Speaker, Viewing the Suffragette Movie with Membership Forms available for attendees, Monitoring and speaking out about County Government Issues. LWVCCA is looking to partner with other non-profits in the area to increase the league's impact and, possibly, get some new members.

Falmouth has a monthly membership meeting open to the public. They had two consensus meetings re money in politics and constitutional amendments, candidates' nights and their annual meeting with a speaker on immigration. They had a membership meeting at Doris Epstein's home to which they sent 20-25 handwritten invitations with follow up phone calls. For their annual meeting they had a speaker on immigration.

They have an active PR program with TV partners. They also put ads in the local newspaper but, of course, not everyone reads the paper.

When the topic of civic ed arose, someone mentioned ICivics - a Sandra O'Connor program which has tools and support for civic education.
